A Study of the Book of Matthew: Chapter 15 v. 15-20

- 15:15-16 "Then Peter answered and said to Him, 'Explain this parable to us.' So Jesus said, 'Are you also still without understanding?'"
 - Peter is the boldest of the disciples.
 - He is the one who asked to walk on water (Matthew 14:28).
 - He is the one who often says what others are thinking but unwilling to speak
 - Mark 8:29 -
 - Luke 18:24-28
 - And here he's the one to speak up. On behalf of the group, Peter asks for explanation of Jesus' comments.
 - Every group of students needs someone like Peter: the one brave enough to introduce good questions and show the teacher what level of understanding the group has reached.
 - "Explain this parable to us."
 - Peter's question refers to Jesus' words in verse 11: that only what comes out of the mouth defiles, not what goes in (Matthew 15:11).
 - Once again Jesus challenges them to think.
 - "Are you also still without understanding?"
 - After all that these men have seen/experienced (His teaching, life, and miracles) they still do you
 not understand.
 - Even though He has dismissed the religious leader, Jesus does not dismiss His disciples.
 - He takes the time to explain truth to them clearly, giving all of us a better chance to understand His meaning.
- 15:17 "Do you not yet understand that whatever enters the mouth goes into the stomach and is eliminated? "
 - Simple fact Physical food enters into and passes out of the body without affecting man's spiritual condition.
 - The law of Moses labeled many edible things as unclean. Consuming those things made the person ceremonially unclean, as well, requiring specific actions be declared "clean" again.
 - The Pharisees' traditions included strict rules meant to prevent even unknowingly contacting these unclean items and consequently required hand-washing before eating (Matthew 15:1–2).
 - What was the original intent of the "food laws"?
 - According to the Pharisees' interpretation, if someone unknowingly touched something unclean, washing your hands according to specific guidelines would keep you from accidentally eating that bit of uncleanness.
 - Jesus has rejected that idea, saying it's not what goes into the mouth that defiles a person; it's what comes out of the mouth that does that **(Matthew 15:11).**

- The disciples asked Jesus to explain this; Peter suggested Jesus was speaking in a parable (Matthew 15:15).
 - But this wasn't a parable.
- Jesus wanted them to understand that what a person eats—the physical substance itself—simply travels through the body.
 - His point is that this is merely a physical process. Food, all by itself, doesn't touch the spirit or soul of a person. It can't cause a person to become sinful.
- This explanation is not meant to dismiss the dietary requirements of the law of Moses (Matthew 5:17–19).
- The *food itself* was not the issue, it was whether a person sought to obey God's command that mattered.
- That is is why ritual handwashing did not keep anyone from sinning.
- Those who *knowingly* ate unclean foods *did become* ceremonially unclean; that uncleanliness was due to their actions and intentions, not mere contact with a physical object.
- 15:18 "But those things which proceed out of the mouth come from the heart, and they defile a man."
 - The things that come out of the mouth reflects what is in man's heart, and do affect one's spiritual condition.
 - Sin (the thing that defiles a man) already live in us.
 - That defilement is revealed by the words a person says.
 - Words show what is inside a person's heart.
 - Compare this statement to Matthew 12:33-37
- 15:19 "For out of the heart proceed evil thoughts, murders, adulteries, fornications, thefts, false witness, blasphemies. "
 - Jesus gives examples
 - No one has ever committed any of these things without having a corrupt heart.
 - To know the heart, we should look at what a person does.
 - "You will know them by their fruits" (Mt 7:20).
 - Works of the Flesh These are the things which truly defile a person (Gal 5:19-21).
- 15:20 "These are the things which defile a man, but to eat with unwashed hands does not defile a man."
 - The scribes and Pharisees were so concerned with these externals that they were not focused on the internal, spiritual things.
 - The spiritual was the focus of Jesus.
 - Jesus finally answers the Pharisee's question.
